OUR LADY OF VICTORY GETS NEW CONFERENCE PRESIDENT


Thank you to Felicia Mulley for giving her time the last couple of years as the OLV conference president.

FARMERS TO FAMILIES DISTRIBUTES IN HASTINGS

The USDA's Agricultural Marketing Service is partnering with national, regional and local food distributors whose workforces have been impacted by the closure of food service businesses to purchase and distribute the food to those in need through the Farmers to Families Food Box program.



The program will supply food boxes of fresh fruits and vegetables, dairy products, meat products and a combination box of fresh produce, dairy or meat products. Distributors will package these products into family-sized boxes, then transport them to food banks,



community and faith-based organizations, and other non-profits serving Americans in need.

Ginny Gates from Lancaster Foods arranged to bring the food boxes to the St. Bernard's Food Pantry in Hastings for distribution on Saturday, September 26.

Ginny said, "It was my pleasure to be in Cambria County, Pennsylvania yesterday with the wonderful

folks of Hastings SVDP Food Pantry as they distributed 576 food boxes to the rural needy."
